

Just a Reminder

Back to Basics

- Greenhouse gases trap **heat.**
- Heat melts snow & ice.
- This causes darker surfaces & more **heat**.
- Water evaporates faster, dries land, and accumulates in atmosphere, trapping more heat, and disrupting weather systems.

WHO IS AT RISK OF CLIMATE CHANGE?

Those living in poverty, as well as women, children and the elderly.

Outdoor workers and people living with chronic medical conditions.

Children are the most vulnerable due to long exposure to environmental risks.



Those living in **megacities, small island developing states** and other **coastal, mountainous and polar regions**.

Countries with weak health systems will be least able to prepare and respond.



Climate change a planetary phenomenon, but its effects are shaped by pervasive & entrenched gender inequality.

Heat waves, droughts, rising sea levels, and extreme storms <u>disproportionately affect</u> <u>women</u>.

Because women are more likely

- · to live in poverty than men,
- have <u>less access to basic human</u>
 <u>rights</u> like the ability to freely move & acquire land, and
- <u>face systematic violence</u> that escalates during periods of instability.

These factors, and many more, mean that as climate change intensifies, women will struggle the most.

Climate change is both a symptom & driver of growing global inequality, and unsustainable development.

You cannot achieve sustainable development without gender equality and environmental justice.

Fast Facts

- In just one day, 200 million hours are consumed by women collecting water for their families.
- Most of the world's 1.2 billion poor [2/3 of whom are women] live in water scarce countries and do not have access to safe & reliable water supplies.
- Women are responsible for 50-80% of world food production but own less than 20% of the land.
- 80% of all illnesses in the developing world is water related.
- Globally, a quarter of all health care facilities have no basic water services.
- Of the estimated 26 million people forced to flee their homes during a climate change event, 20 million are women and girls.
- Women and children are 14 times more likely than men to die during a natural disaster. (Poor healthcare services & inadequate access for women contributes heavily.)
- Women are more affected by bad air quality since it directly affects fetus & maternal health. Globally, 800+ women* die daily, from preventable causes related to pregnancy.
- The uneven distribution of biodiversity & dire deforestation hotspots has endangered human habitats risking women & children and reducing productivity of 23% of global land surface.
- According to a 2019 Richler Study of 91 countries, there is a strong correlation between the percentage of women in national parliaments and a prioritization of climate change policies.
- The World Bank found that water sector projects that included women were at least six times more effective than those that did not.

2021


- ► Zonta International Board approved and pubished official statement on Climate Change and Gender Equality

ZONTA'S LAUNCH TIMELINE 2021 continued...

- ▶ District 12 Conference Governor Ann Hodgson called for a committee on climate change and gender equality. The AEGE committee; 'Action for Environment and Gender Equality' committee was formed.
- ► In preparation for the Commission of the Status of Women 66, the US Women's Caucus at the UN researched & released global and specific recommendations for climate action.

IDEAS FOR LOCAL SERVICE AND ADVOCACY

- Share a simple Environmental Action-of-the-Day in your newsletters.
- Invite a panel of local political & business leaders to discuss how they are responding to climate change (policies & programs). Have your members pose the questions.
- Research on foot to learn the barriers for families to do to recycling in your city or county and work together to problem-solve & remove the barriers.
- Host a 'Recycle Day' to educate & practice recycling in your community.
 Make it a 'festival'- offer prizes/Team T-shirts/swag...
- Host a progressive 'water-wise' garden luncheon to learn about water-wise landscaping. Learn where your water
 comes from & where it goes. [Who are the knowledgeable, conscientious users? How can that be incentivized? Should big abuse and waste be sanctioned? How?
- Get ideas from your Z-Club for a 'Fridays for Future' educational & networking event.
 Learn about Ecowomen, Women Food & Ag Network, and other grassroots (very informed) activists and partner with them.
- Contact your <u>local</u> League of Women Voters to learn & support its environmental platform. Collaborate with UNA, AAUW, BPW, etc. around the nexus of the climate crisis & and women.
